Approval of Agenda of January 29, 2014 And Minutes October 28, 2013	 The agenda was approved as outlined. A motion to approve the draft minutes of October 28, 2103 was made first by Rebecca and second by Braxton. The minutes of October 28, 2013 were approved as amended.

Superintendent's update	 Very few secondary alternative schools start at grade 9. There are a few elementary alternative schools with transition pathways for their students. Alternative Secondary schools belong to a Family of Schools area with other regular schools. There are many reasons for students choosing another secondary school outside the alternative school system. The difference between alternative secondary and specialized schools offering specialized areas of study is that alternative schools serve niches of diverse cultures (eg. social needs) and highneeds areas (eg. Credits, pedagogy, section programming, Sections schools and Community schools, Schools of Choice, Focus schools,), but the pathway from grade 8 to grade 9 is missing. STUDENT PATHWAYS: Different Alternative Schools of interest have differentiated transition pathways for students and some involve interview intake and lottery-based enrolments. Develop pathways for transitioning before students choose a school to prepare solutions to issues around programming. **Staff Undertaking: The Optional Attendance policy is currently being reviewed with a lens to improving pathway choices and staff will undertake to bring consultation to ASAC through PIAC. Stakeholder Participating in hiring	 Parents, teachers and students should be involved in the hiring and selection of principals for alt. schools. Hiring and selection of principals/vice principals is a continuing challenge. Working with elementary co-chair on procedures and concerns to select an elementary principal requires an SSON procedure is open for discussion with the superintendents now that parent gave input on principal hiring via the School Statement of Needs (SSON). It was suggested that students should have a separate form to give feedback for principal selection. It was suggested that parents should be approached by school to give input on principal selection. It was suggested that parents should be involved in the hiring and selection of teachers for alt. schools. It would be nice if the practice was consistent. The Union for Teachers feels uncomfortable evaluating its own members, but the TDSB would welcome teachers being involved in the process. There is no policy or standard practice for the selection process. Allocations of teachers and Budget allocations within alt. schools remains a challenge. More Professional Development for alternative teachers is needed. Professional Development with other alternative school teachers would be great. In some alt secondary schools, the principals survey the students for course interests before making teacher selections. It is expected that parents and students give feedback on their needs for principals and teachers at Student and Parent School Councils. It is challenging for principals when teachers get bumped into an alt school even though the teacher placed wants another school. TEACHER PATHWAYS: The discussion remained in the boardroom on transition pathways working toward having teachers and parents on hiring committees for teachers who become principals. ***HIRING Committee was started to share ideas and guidelines for hiring teachers and principals at alternative schools. 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	 COMMUNICATION with CLOUD-COMPUTING STRATEGIES: AcademicWorkspace (AW) is an electronic cloud-computing platform being used by students and teachers of Toronto District School Board as a connection point to have discussions and forums. ASAC is welcome to share at that point so that ASAC can work with students to work on a website. GoogleApps can be offered to ASAC and ASAC is welcome to meet with Peter Singh and Manon Gardner to set that up to have forums, share documents, and post learning resources. ASAC should be a source of information for Alternative Schools. Some schools struggle to maintain their Alternative School philosophies due to changes; some schools are in the process of redefining or reaffirming their philosophies. Teachers need private conversations with other teachers on AW. Outside of AW, parents are expected to talk to other parents: Parents requested ASAC to provide some clarification/support for parents. Teachers are expected to talk to other teachers. Guidance counselors are expected to talk to other guidance counselors.
