

February is African Heritage Month! This year's theme is Nia: Walking in our Purpose. Throughout February, the Centre of Excellence for Black Student Achievement in collaboration with various community educators are offering diverse learning experiences focused on honouring and affirming African, African-Caribbean and Black students' identities and embedding African-centred practices in instructional programming. During February and beyond, experiences that support educators in cultivating school and classroom environments focusing on enhancing joy, building positive racial identity development, and affirming students' experiences and identities will be offered. Focused Ultrasound High School Summer Research Program

In collaboration with Sunnybrook Hospital and Research Institute, Black-identifying students in Grades 11 & 12 (aged 16-18 years) are invited to explore STEM and healthcare research as a viable academic and career pathway.

The Focused Ultrasound High School Summer Research Program is an eightweek paid opportunity, where students will:

- Receive 1:1 mentorship with health professionals.
- Gain hands-on knowledge through Experimental, Programming, Biology or Engineering and Technology Development projects.

The Black Students in Business
Collective is a partnership between the
Centre of Excellence for Black Student
Achievement, Ivey Business School at
Western University, Schulich School of
Business at York University and Smith
School of Business at Queen's
University.

The Black Students in Business
Collective launched on January 13, 2022
for students in Grades 10 interested in
exploring business as a post-secondary
pathway. During this session, students
learned about academic and career
opportunities in business, and the
breadth of offerings from the three
business schools.

Participants heard messages of inspiration from business school deans and from guest speaker, TDSB and Ivey alumni Sakariya Ahmed.

On January 6 and 27 enhanced learning sessions were also held to support Grade 11 and 12 students with their post-secondary applications.
