



Mark Sandler, LL.B., LL.D. (honoris causa) is widely recognized as one of Canada's leading criminal lawyers and pro bono advocates. He has been involved in combatting antisemitism for about 40 years. He has lectured extensively on legal remedies to combat hate, trained police and prosecutors on hate crimes, and has promoted respectful Muslim-Jewish, Sikh-Jewish and Black-Jewish dialogues. He has appeared before Parliamentary committees and in the Supreme Court of Canada on multiple occasions on issues relating to antisemitism and hate activities. He is a

former member of the Ontario Human Rights Tribunal, a three-time elected Bencher of the Law Society of Ontario, and recipient of the criminal profession's highest honour, the G. Arthur Martin Medal, for his contributions to the administration of criminal justice. He is a former National Chair and Senior Counsel of B'nai Brith's League for Human Rights, and is currently the founder and Chair of the Alliance of Canadians Combatting Antisemitism (ALCCA), a diverse coalition of 50+ community organizations and groups that collaboratively address antisemitism through advocacy, education and respectful dialogue. Dr. Karen Mock is an educational psychologist, teacher educator, former Executive Director of the *Canadian Race Relations Foundation* and of the *League for Human Rights of B'nai Brith Canada*, the latter for whom she led the Holocaust and Hope Educators' Study Tour to Germany, Poland and Israel from 1990 to 2000. She has been qualified by the Canadian Courts and Human Rights Tribunals as an expert on racism, discrimination, antisemitism, hate and hate group activity. Karen chaired the *Hate Crimes Community Working Group* for the Attorney General and Minister of Community Safety and Corrections, was the Senior Policy Advisor to the Minister of Education for the development and delivery of Ontario's *Equity and Inclusive Education Strategy*, and she chaired the Canadian

Advisory Committee to the Secretary of State for Multiculturalism under both Conservative and Liberal federal governments. Among the many awards and honours received for her human rights work and intercultural dialogue spanning over 40 years, Karen received the Queen's Diamond Jubilee medal "for contribution to her peers, community and country", and in 2017 was awarded the Order of Canada. Dr. Mock is immediate past chair of the Pearson Centre for Progressive Policy, and is currently coordinating the Enhancing Social Justice Education group (ESJE) whose vision is to ensure equitable and inclusive education by putting policies into practice such that no learner, educator, family, caregiver or community member is silenced or marginalized and can achieve their full potential.
